Music (classical)


any extreme emotion mood is moderate; does not describe

Literature

- stresses human emotions over the rational mind

Music

- passion and instruments express great sadness, joy, or mood is emotional; a wide variety of rhythms
- suddenly; may use very high to very low pitches melody is dramatic; volume may change

Realist Art

importance of showing people and their lives as they really are. how unpleasant or unheroic they might be. depict situations from daily life, no matter to 1900. The realist period lasted from about the 1830s Realist artists emphasized the Realistic works of art



Painting

- based on details of daily life
- shown scenes of common people at work are often
- figures are dressed in daily, casual, or work clothes
- the human body is not idealized
- faces do not show strong emotions
- on and around figures and objects artists attempt to paint light as it really looks

Literature

describes the middle class criticizes the greed and bad manners of the hardships of everyday life and

Music (verismo)

- mood changes with scene to imitate in opera, real-life situation of everyday characters a play with its text set to music,
- melody imitates human speech and voice and conveys realistic emotions
